From the Heart of the Pastor!

This week is generally known as Holy Week in Christian circles. It falls between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. One story has it that a Presidential Committee of Naming Holidays met on a Sunday before Easter. One of the members became enlightened and slapped his forehead with his palm and exclaimed, "Next Sunday is Easter!" And that Sunday they were meeting became Palm Sunday! False! Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday with the commemoration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and ends with the resurrection of Jesus the Christ on Sunday morning, Easter Sunday. On those Sunday mornings,, we often focus on the joy. We shake hands. We wave branches. We sing uplifting hymns. We hear hopeful sermons. We smile. We talk about grace and blessings and gratitude. It seems we are very good at doing Sundays. But what happened between the two Sundays is seldom told. Well, sometimes, maybe Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

What happened during Holy Week, in between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday is a microcosm of what goes on with our lives every week in between Sundays. There is need for a Jesus who triumphantly enters into our hearts, work with us throughout the week and then celebrate Easter every Sunday. As clergy and pastors, in our offices and pastoral activities, what we hear about Jesus during those days in between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday is the same as what we hear every day in our pastoral visits and in our offices. It's too bad we do not talk about it too much.

Mark tells us that after Jesus entered the Temple in Jerusalem, He withdrew to Bethany with his disciples. Then, beginning on Monday, came the encounter with the leafy fig tree, the teachings and come Maundy Thursday and Good Friday! What a hectic week! A week of trials and temptation, betrayal and even death on the cross. When our parishioners leave the church on Sundays, they step into a different world altogether. Between Sundays, I personally visit with parishioners; and non -parishioners; regular attendees and those not so regular attendees who are facing struggles that few in their lives understand. Some are injured or sick; hurt or depressed. Others are thriving and prosperous. Some are bereaved and heart-broken. Some are wrestling with doubt while others are connected with the Lord without doubt. They know it!

For me, both Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday are important, very important. They give us reason for celebration, the waving of palm branches and the sharing of the flowers, the Easter lilies! I love all that. But the most comforting part of Holy Week is to know what happened in between the Sundays! It is very comforting to know that on Maundy Thursday, Jesus shared a table with the people he loved the most. He washed their feet, and showing that the mark of a true leader is whether they can serve others, What is comforting for me is to know that Jesus still loves those disciples even though he knew that, at best, they were going to abandon him, and at worst, they were going to betray him. And in the garden, alone, heart-broken, Jesus struggles between what he wanted to do and what he knew he had to do. Sounds familiar!

And on Good Friday, it continues! The world turns against him. And those who cheered him on his triumphant entry into Jerusalem are now jeering him on the cross or the crowd has changed. Jesus suffered. He called to a God who does not seem to answer, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me!" Jesus, like me doubts. He feels pain, and loss and grief! And finally he gives up life as we know it.

This is what happens in between Sundays every week, every month and every year. As a pastor, as human as we are, sometimes we feel hopeless and helpless. But then I am reminded of what Jesus Christ did on Maundy Thursday and on Good Friday. When asked by people who are going through a difficult time, whether they think God is angry because they have doubts, or when they wonder why God does not seem to be answering prayers. Or when they ask if God understands when we suffer, or when we feel alone.

When they do ask, I know where I point them to; I point first not to the Christ of Palm Sunday or Easter, but to the Christ of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday! The One who lived like one of us! Who doubted like one of us! Who loved as one of us! Who suffered as one of us. And who died like one of us! And only after then, do I point to the Christ who rose again, and overcame the worst that the world can throw at him!

I am sometimes worried that we are forgetting the lessons of Holy Week. More churches are canceling mid-week services and church activities due to low attendance and over-scheduled members. I wonder if we are losing that time we once had to sit with Christ in his own human struggles? And I wonder if when we lose that time, do we then lose our ability to learn to sit with others in their struggles, and with ourselves in our own?! We have the capacity to be those people! All we have to do is to be willing to make the journey with him who called. Not just on Sundays, but on the days between. The world has plenty of Sunday morning Christians. It needs a few more of the weekday ones!

Christ is risen, He is risen indeed! Kennedy Mukwindidza.


Prayer to be full of the Holy Spirit

On Monday she gave each student his or her list. Before long, the entire class was smiling. 'Really?' she heard whispered. 'I never knew that I

meant anything to anyone!' and, 'I didn't know others liked me so much,' were most of the comments.
